The ArrowMight Program will support the development of skills for critical thinking and analysis. It promotes values of equity, inclusivity, respect for cultural differences and importance of civil responsibility in progressing family, community and country.

It is a life-changing program encouraging families to plan to succeed by working together and supporting one another. ArrowMight provides computer literacy in Module 4, requiring the use of an ArrowMight laptop that is pre-installed with the lessons and exercises necessary to complete the program. Students that successfully complete the Virtual Home-Based Computing (VHBC) Module may take ownership of the loaned laptop.
